AI (artificial intelligence) is changing the world of medicine quickly. Many experts are hopeful that AI could help us defeat serious illnesses like cancer and Alzheimer's disease*. Demis Hassabis, the CEO (chief executive officer) of Google DeepMind, said in a podcast that we are possibly only a few years away from seeing the first real AI-designed drugs for major illnesses such as cancer or heart disease.

Today, big technology companies like Google are already using AI to discover new medicines. Hassabis explained that his company has signed major deals with pharmaceutical* companies. He expects that in the next few years, some of these AI-created drugs will begin clinical testing. This news is exciting for researchers who want to make medical treatments faster, more effective, and more personal.

One of the next big goals in this field is AGI (artificial general intelligence). AGI is a form of AI that can think and learn more like humans. Scientists believe AGI could revolutionize how we develop new medicines. Even now, AI is helping doctors in many ways. It can help analyze medical images, interpret lab results, and even suggest treatments that a human doctor might miss. In the future, AI may also predict how patients will respond to different treatments based on their personal genetic information*.

However, not everyone believes that a world without disease is possible. Nadia Akseer, a scientist from Johns Hopkins University, warned that diseases are always changing. She said we cannot know what the future

holds, especially with global threats like pandemics or climate change. While AI offers powerful tools, it may not be able to solve every medical problem.

Still, the current impact of AI on healthcare is already strong. Professor Zak Kohane from Harvard Medical School said AI could greatly improve how doctors treat patients. For example, AI might detect small changes in medical records that a human doctor might not catch. This could help predict problems before they become serious. AI can also help doctors choose the best treatments based on the unique features of a patient's condition, such as the genetic mutation* of a tumor*.

Even though these developments are exciting, they also bring challenges. Some experts worry that AI might increase healthcare inequalities between rich and poor countries. Others point to legal and safety concerns about how AI should be used. Professor Kohane explained that AI is only a tool. It is up to society and government to decide how to use it wisely. He said, "There needs to be political will in order for many of the benefits to be realized." In other words, AI can help us a lot, but it is not a magical solution on its own.

Glaciers* around the world are melting at an increasingly rapid pace, according to a new international study. Scientists warn that this acceleration may be faster than previously expected and could lead to a more significant rise in sea levels. Glaciers play a critical role in regulating the Earth's climate and storing freshwater for billions of people. But as global temperatures continue to rise, driven by greenhouse gas emissions*, these massive ice bodies are shrinking* faster than ever.

In a global assessment, researchers found that between 2012 and 2023, glaciers lost about 36% more ice than they did during the period from 2000 to 2011. On average, the annual ice loss reached 273 billion tons — equivalent to the water consumption of the global population for 30 years. Michael Zemp, a professor at the University of Zurich and co-author of the study published in Nature, described the findings as “shocking,” though not entirely unexpected in the context of ongoing climate change.

Since the start of the 21st century, glaciers worldwide have lost approximately 5% of their total volume. However, the rate of loss differs significantly by region. In Antarctica, the loss is relatively small — around 2% — while in the European Alps, up to 40% of glacier volume has already disappeared. Zemp noted that smaller glaciers are particularly vulnerable and many are unlikely to survive until the end of the century. The retreat of glaciers threatens not only sea levels but also freshwater supplies in regions such as Central Asia and the Andes.

This research was led by three organizations: the World Glacier Monitoring Service (WGMS), the University of Edinburgh, and a company called Earthwave. It combined satellite data with on-the-ground measurements

to produce a reference estimate of global ice loss. Zemp, who heads the WGMS, emphasized that the results suggest glacier melt is progressing faster than expected in the most recent report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). As a result, sea levels may rise more than earlier estimates predicted.

Glaciers are the second-largest contributor to sea-level rise, after thermal expansion of seawater caused by warming. Since 2000, glacier melt alone has contributed nearly 2 centimeters to global sea-level rise. This may seem minor, but scientists estimate that this increase has already exposed nearly 4 million additional people to the risk of coastal flooding. Moreover, researchers are concerned about how the massive ice sheets of Greenland and Antarctica might respond in the future. Martin Siegert, a professor at the University of Exeter, warned that while current changes are measured in centimeters, continued ice sheet loss could result in sea-level rise measured in meters.

For decades, glaciers have served as clear indicators of human-caused climate change. In the 20th century, scientists used direct field observations to monitor around 500 glaciers, measuring snowfall and melt. Today, with the aid of satellites, scientists can monitor changes in more than 275,000 glaciers globally using advanced tools such as radar, lasers, and mass analysis. In January 2025, the United Nations declared that protecting the world's glaciers is a vital "survival strategy." As Zemp put it, "To do that, you have to reduce greenhouse gas emissions—it is as simple and complicated as that. Every tenth of a degree of warming that we avoid saves us money, saves us lives, and saves us problems."
